This competition celebrates the visual art of handwriting. In an age that encourages the early adoption of keyboard skills, we wish to champion, nurture, and celebrate writing by hand.

Year Groups and Eligibility

Only schools whose Head is a Member with ISA are eligible to enter ISA competitions. Any pupils competing must be on the main school's admissions register on the date of the event.

Our year groups follow the UK National Curriculum. For guidance on selecting the correct year group for your student(s), please refer to the UK system [here](#). When completing your application, please enter students according to the UK year group, even if your school uses a different age or stage structure.

Access and Inclusion

At ISA, we are committed to making our opportunities as accessible as possible. We warmly welcome applications from all students, including those with learning difficulties or disabilities.

Judging Criteria

- Legibility – how easily the writing can be read and the formatting of the letters making them legible.
- Fluency – smoothness and flow of the writing. For the older years, has the writing style been defined and flow naturally.
- Competence – Spacing between letters and words, consistency of letter size, is it along a straight line.
- Accuracy and neatness.
- Correct punctuation – Capital letters and punctuation in the right place.
- For the older years, has the writing style been defined and flow naturally.

HOW TO ENTER

Entries must be submitted via the online form on the ISA website [here](#) by **Tuesday 27 April 2027** at the latest. Please note you will need to be logged in to your account to access the entry form.

- For individual entries, all files need to be submitted with the **school's name followed by the student's name e.g. SchoolName_JohnSmith**. This helps us identify clearly each student's entry that has been submitted.
- Entries must be submitted in either a **PDF** or **Word** format only.
- Students must use the templates available on our website. Teachers may print these for use. Each student must use one template only per entry, they cannot combine two together.
- Please only submit a clear photo/scan of the entry, ensure no children appear on the photo.

COMPETITION CATEGORIES

Schools can submit a **maximum of 10 entries in total, spread across all year groups from Year 1 to Year 13**. Cursive or non-cursive entries are welcome. We encourage schools to run a competition in house and submit their best entries.

Please see below the set poems for each age category. **Individual entries only, no groups**. Please note some year groups might be combined for judging process.

Rules

- Entries should be on one single sheet of **plain white A4 paper**, with a suitable margin.
- Line guides can be accessed on our website, if desired, but spacing should be planned to suit the individual pupil's handwriting.
- Each entry must include the school's name and pupil name and their category clearly written in the bottom right of the page.
- Handwriting can be in pencil or black or blue ink.
- Entries must include all the text from the poems below, including the title and the name of the author/poet if this is known.
- **AI generated entries will not be allowed in the competition.**
- Entries previously submitted to ISA Arts Competitions will not be accepted.
- All entries must be the students original work, which have never been published.
