## **History of the School**

Faraday Prep School is an independent preparatory school based in the heart of East London's historic docklands. Established with a commitment to creativity and inquiry-led learning, Faraday is uniquely positioned within the vibrant Trinity Buoy Wharf—a renowned artistic community and cultural hub. The school's physical setting, surrounded by over 500 artists, sculptors, musicians, and designers, has shaped its curriculum and ethos, embedding creativity at the centre of its educational vision. Named after the legendary scientist and inventor Michael Faraday, the school draws inspiration from both innovation and artistic expression to provide a dynamic and interdisciplinary education for children aged 4 to 11.

Founded to provide an intimate and nurturing environment, Faraday Prep School has always prioritised the individual needs of its pupils. ## **Aims**

Faraday Prep School's approach to teaching and learning in Art and Design is underpinned by four key objectives:



• To Embed Creativity Across the Curriculum

Faraday believes that creative learning should not be confined to one subject but should inform all areas of a child's education. The school designs projects that combine art, science, literacy, and history, promoting deeper understanding and personal expression.

- To Foster Real-World Artistic Engagement
  Through active partnerships with professional artists and cultural organisations,
  Faraday provides pupils with opportunities to collaborate on meaningful creative
  projects, both within school and in the wider London arts scene.
- To Celebrate Cultural Diversity Through the Arts Creative learning at Faraday is a vehicle for global understanding. Pupils engage in projects that explore diverse cultural heritages, such as African wax print textile design, encouraging a broader worldview.
- To Showcase Pupil Voice and Achievement
  The school values original thought and personal expression. Pupils' creative work is
  regularly exhibited at professional venues such as City Hall, the Trinity Art Gallery,
  and even featured in prestigious competitions like the Royal Academy Summer
  Show.









#### **OUTCOMES**

Faraday Prep School's commitment to immersive, interdisciplinary and experiential art education has led to transformative outcomes for its pupils and community.



- Authentic Artistic Experiences with Industry Professionals
  Pupils have collaborated with acclaimed creatives including stop-motion
  animator Tim Allen (Fantastic Mr Fox), Nike designer Kieron Booth, and poet
  Hussain Manawer. These partnerships have led to imaginative projects like
  poetry, animation, and digital art, significantly enriching the pupils' exposure to
  creative industries.
- Curriculum Innovation through Cross-Disciplinary Projects
  In one example, Year 4 students studied Lewis Carroll's Jabberwocky, crafting their own nonsense poems in English and then designing booklets in Computing, which were professionally printed. This project showcased how creative disciplines can be combined to enhance literacy, design, and publishing skills.
- Experiential Learning Linked to Local Culture and Geography
  Year 3's project on African wax prints saw pupils visit Dalston's Ridley Road
  Market to select fabrics before creating their own Ankara cushions. Through this,
  pupils explored textile design alongside African history and geography—learning
  through doing.
- Art as a Medium for Understanding Local Heritage
  In a striking use of their surroundings, pupils travelled via speedboat with
  photographer Michael Collins to explore Beckton Gasworks, learning about
  London's industrial past. They created recycled material sculptures that were
  publicly exhibited, connecting environmental awareness with historical inquiry.
- Landmark Projects with Community Impact
  The Homecoming project celebrated the return of the SS Robin—an historic
  Victorian steamship built at Trinity Buoy Wharf. Pupils worked alongside arts
  collectives and puppeteers to produce a shadow puppet theatre production on
  board the ship, incorporating history, music, science, and drama. This ambitious,
  multi-disciplinary collaboration demonstrated Faraday's ability to link heritage,
  creativity, and performance in meaningful ways.











## **NEXT STEPS**

Faraday Prep School is committed to continuing its development as a centre of creative excellence. The next phase of the school's journey includes:

- Expanding Professional Artist Residencies
  Plans are in place to deepen partnerships with Trinity Buoy Wharf creatives,
  bringing more artists into the classroom and extending projects across multiple
  year groups.
- Developing Pupil Exhibitions Beyond the School Following successes at City Hall and the Trinity Art Gallery, Faraday aims to increase participation in national art competitions and local public showcases, giving pupils a platform for their voice and talent.
- Integrating Digital and Sustainable Art Practices
  Faraday is exploring new ways to incorporate digital media and environmentally
  conscious practices into the curriculum, ensuring pupils are equipped with 21stcentury creative skills.
- Building Global Connections Through the Arts
  Future projects aim to connect Faraday pupils with international schools through
  shared creative endeavours, reflecting the school's commitment to community,
  diversity, and curiosity on a global scale.

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
